"Early in the morning Jesus stood on the shore, but the disciples did not realize it was Jesus....Jesus said this to indicate the kind of death by which Peter would glorify God. Then he said to him, "Follow me!"

John 21: 4-19

The passage found in the 21st chapter of John is one of my favorites because it tells of the third time Jesus appeared to the disciples after his resurrection. On this occasion the disciples had been out all night fishing without good results. In the early morning they saw Jesus on the shore and he beckoned them to lower their

nets on the other side of the boat at which they caught so many fish they could hardly haul the nets in. Furthermore, when they got to shore, Jesus was there with a charcoal fire fixing breakfast and he invited the disciples to sit down and let him feed them breakfast.

I have always wondered what it must have been like for those disciples, or what it would be like for any of us now, if we were to see Jesus in the early morning and he invited us to sit down while he served us the breakfast that he had just cooked. I am sure the disciples were in awe and probably bewildered, but all of them obeyed and let Jesus serve them yet again.

But the story doesn't end there. Right after serving them breakfast Jesus asked Peter three times if Peter loved him and three times Peter responded that he did but at last had to say "Lord you know all things." I am sure that there are many points of view and interpretations of these passages. For me, I find it interesting that before Jesus reinstates Peter into the fold, he first feeds all of them breakfast. It is as if through his actions Jesus is saying that before he challenges or urges us to move forward, he will feed us with what we

need spiritually before he asks us to follow him, wherever that might lead.

In many ways, when I come to one of our Gatherings, I feel as if all of us are being fed through the Holy Spirit that fills the lives of each person there. We are fed through the experience of prayer, of music, of heartfelt fellowship, and especially through the taking of Holy Communion. I never leave a Gathering where I have not experienced the indwelling of the Holy Spirit. With this in mind, I want to encourage all of us to consider what gifts we bring when we come to a Gathering and conversely what the Gathering misses when we are not there. When one of us is not there we truly are missed. I, therefore, would like to encourage each of you to try to come to the Gatherings, bringing with you your unique gifts of love and joy, needs and praises to share in the feasting through the Holy Spirit.

From the Community Spiritual Director ...

As I write this we are in the midst of the Easter season. What a blessed time of year, but we can celebrate the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ daily. We gave out a booklet on Easter Sunday by Max Lucado entitled, "Give it All to Him." It is a wonderful story

about new beginnings. Isn't it great how we can have a new beginning every day in Christ Jesus?

Think back to 1986. Ronald Reagan was in the White House, the Dow Jones Industrial Average was at 1,750, and Duran-Duran was at the top of the pop charts. This was also the year that the Khian Sea, an ocean-going barge containing seven tons of ash from incinerated household garbage, set sail from Philadelphia to dispose of its load in an overseas landfill. Sixteen years later, the Khian Sea has at last returned to Philadelphia—with its original load of ash.

In the meantime, the Khian Sea had sailed around the world, trying to find a country—any country—that would accept the ash for disposal. The Khian Sea originally had a contract with the Bahamas, but en route the Bahamian government changed its mind and reneged on its contract. Turned away from its original destination, the Khian Sea tried several other Caribbean and Central American nations without success. Even Haiti wouldn't take it. So then the ship set off to Africa, trying to unload its cargo (for a fee) in Guinea-Bissau, Senegal, and

Cape Verde. No go. From there the ship steamed to Sri Lanka, Indonesia, Borneo, and the Philippines. No takers. So they came back to North America, and tried several

states. They even tried the Cherokee nation in Oklahoma. No deal.

Some ports turned away the Khian Sea at gunpoint. During its Flying Dutchman odyssey around the world, the crew mutinied, and two executives of the shipping company went to prison for ordering the crew to dump the ash over the side in the middle of the ocean. The ship was sold once and renamed twice, apparently hoping that it could slip its unwanted cargo by a harbormaster under a different name. Finally Pennsylvania agreed to take back its trash and bury it in a local landfill, near where it came from in the first place.

Do you have some garbage you would like to get rid of? Are you having a hard time finding a place to dump it? Most of us have an imaginary bag with loads of life's experiences just weighing us down. Oh, to be rid of this garbage. Well Jesus wants to take it from you. Jesus invites us to come lay down our burdens and instead to

take up his yoke. He tells us it is light and that we can find rest for our souls in Him. Jesus is the good shepherd and he understands you and your burden. He wants to carry your load.

We are told: 14 Therefore, since we have a great high priest who has gone through the heavens, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold firmly to the faith we profess. ¹⁵ For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are-yet was without sin. ¹⁶Let us then approach the throne of arace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need. (Heb. 4:14-16)

It's time to take out the trash, in fact just let Jesus have it. That's why He died and rose again so we can have eternal freedom in Him. He has made this provision freely for us so we can have a fresh new day.

Jesus is supreme, in fact has been from the beginning and is now leading the resurrection parade, which makes him supreme to the end. From beginning to end he's there, towering far above everything and everyone. So spacious is he, so roomy, that everything of God finds its proper place in him without crowding. Not only that, but all the broken and dislocated pieces of the universe-people and things, animals and atoms-get properly fixed and fit together in vibrant harmonies, all because of his death, through his blood that poured down from the Cross on Calvary.

"Is Fort Wayne, Indiana home?" I asked the particularly friendly lady on the front row of the airplane as I strapped myself into my jump seat preparing for landing. She smiled and replied, "Fort Wayne is where I live, but I will always call Toledo, Ohio home!"

As I was pondering the meaning of the word, "home," I went to the Dictionary and found the word defined as one's place of residence, a familiar or usual setting, the focus of one's domestic attention, and/or a place of origin.

I usually spend at least three nights a week in hotel rooms. In order to make myself at home,
