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From the Community Lay Director...

"Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see." Hebrews 11:1

Have you ever felt that you were living your life in a dense fog? Your eyes seem clouded and your ears muffled. You blink and press your hands against your eyes, hoping to clear your vision. You cup your hand behind your ear and listen carefully, straining for any hint of sound. You think there is something beyond the fog – you certainly want to believe that there is something beyond the fog – but, try as you will, you cannot see anything out there. So you take a deep breath, say a prayer, and take a small step – then another – then another – all the while holding on tightly to the promises of God. You walk by faith rather than by sight.

The eleventh chapter of Hebrews is all about walking by faith. Verse after verse begins with the words; "By faith . . ." The writer acknowledges and commends the faith of Noah, Abraham, Moses, Rahab, David, and many others. None of these men and women could see what was out there. They discovered that not everything that happened to them was what they had planned or anticipated. Yet they persevered through ridicule, uncertainty, persecution, danger, bad decisions and sometimes despair. They held on tightly to the promises of God and acted on the certainty of a joyous future they could not see.

If you find yourself in a fog, take comfort in the certainty that there is a joyous future for all who place their trust in Christ. Take comfort, too, in these examples of faith that were left for us by the writer of Hebrews so that we might be strengthened and persevere through the fog into the bright, shining light of Christ and everlasting life in His presence.

Turn your eyes upon Jesus, Look full in His wonderful face, And the things of earth will grow strangely dim, In the light of His glory and grace.

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Cha Training

Think of us in this way, as servants of Christ and stewards of God's mysteries.

All service to the community should be done with our Purpose in mind.

Our Purpose:

From the Upper Room: The Walk to Emmaus is a spiritual renewal program intended to *strengthen the local church* through the *development of Christian disciples and leaders*. The program's approach seriously considers the model of Christ's servant hood and encourages Christ's disciples to act in ways appropriate to being "a servant of all." **From our By-Laws:** The purpose of the Fredericksburg Emmaus shall be to *inspire*, *challenge*, *and equip church members for Christian* action, in their homes, churches, places of work, and the world community through the Emmaus experience.

Our goal, our common goal is to have pilgrims attend a weekend and to have the best experience possible from doing so. Where we have problems is that we sometimes disagree on the way that should be done. I am going to take much of my material from the Emmaus manual because, even though we may not agree with it, the people who wrote it have had a lot of experience in putting on weekends and working with large groups of diverse people.

The very thing that makes Emmaus wonderful, the diversity of its people, is also the very thing that can cause deep disagreements. So please listen to my heart. We are not trying to make a bunch of rules. We as a board do not want to legislate the community to death. But we want to educate it to life. I take this as my mandate. The things I am about to outline are not hard fast rules; they are suggestions to help the whole community toward our purposes and goals.

Remember that people that are giving behind the scenes support are channels of grace and love. Your behind the scene service is an offering of living agape. The basic guideline for persons serving in any support role is to serve humbly, selflessly and invisibly, insofar as that is possible. These roles are exercises in anonymous servant hood. While the roles bring great personal satisfaction and are among the favorite avenues of service, they are not occasions for outward recognition by the team or by the pilgrims. The reward for these acts of service comes in giving and the reward is great.

It is suggested that Chas keep their contact with pilgrims in the dining hall in the role of servants. Interaction should be kept to a minimum, and should only be initiated by the pilgrims. Having said that, the manual also says the staff should be kind, courteous, warm and cheerful. So when spoken to, you do not respond by saying, "I'm not allowed to talk to you". What they are trying to avoid is having a cha trying to start a conversation by saying something like... "How is your weekend going?" Everyone has a different response to a weekend. We don't want a pilgrim to be made uncomfortable if they are not having "a good time".

Another issue that comes up on a weekend is that some people are not comfortable being served. They want to get their own water or their own brownie. Do not slap the pilgrim's hand and tell them they can't do that! You might smile and say, "It is my privilege to be here to serve you, may I bring you something?"

Another item is volunteering to cha while a spouse, family member, or a pilgrim you have sponsored is on a weekend. The manual simply states that this should be discouraged, however if you want to serve you should talk to the cha coordinator and see if you can serve in areas where you will not be seen. The purpose of this is to avoid distractions and to allow the pilgrim to have their own experience on the weekend. Then they would not feel the need to respond to activities a certain way to please a spouse or sponsor.

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Cha Training continued...

I will remind you that this should go for Team members as well or even more so. Many times during weekends I have witnessed ALDs needing to go and drag table leaders out of the dining room away from their families so the weekend could continue. This is not appropriate for team members to be talking to and hugging on family members in the presence of pilgrims who are cloistered from their families. Nor is it appropriate to delay the schedule for such things.

There is no childcare provided for Chas, so if you bring children with you they should be old enough to be responsible for themselves and respectful of the environment they are in.

Again remember that these are guidelines designed to help us have the best weekend possible.

Come with a willing heart, open hands and a servant attitude. Keep your purpose in mind and in front of you. The reminder What Would Jesus Do is appropriate here.

LIFE CHANGE AT DAWN!

She arose before dawn, dressed, gathered her spices, and began the long walk. Soon other women such as Mary, the mother of James; Salome and Joanne joined her on the journey through the narrow, winding streets of Jerusalem. They traveled through the city gate, across the Kidron Valley and into the garden. How would the stone be moved aside? They arrived at the garden tomb before dawn.

Two angels appeared from nowhere and one asked the penetrating question: "Why do you seek the living among the dead?" Soon, thereafter, she saw another figure whom she mistook to be the gardener. They talked briefly. In the next moment her life was changed forever! She would never be the same! Her gloom, depression and bereavement were replaced by the experience of the resurrection! Unspeakable joy was instantaneously hers! Radiance filled her soul! Her heart bubbled over! The Master had come back to life! Her Lord was alive forever more!

It is interesting to note that Jesus had actually been out of the tomb for an hour or two prior to this life changing face-to-face confrontation. However, the resurrection of Jesus was meaningless until she saw with her own eyes. He was dead as far as she was concerned until that meeting. Friend, have you experienced the risen Christ or is He still dead for you?

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Have you ever seen the cartoon with the two buzzards sitting on a tree limb? One says to other, "Hey Mac, do you think we will ever eat again?" Mac replies with encouragement, "You have to have patience Lenny, and a meal will come along." Lenny thinks for a moment and replies, "Forget about patience, I am going to Taco Bell!"

Isn't waiting the worst? It seems we all have to wait for something every day. We go to work in the morning and wait for traffic lights and traffic to move. We wait in line at the store for a cashier to ring up our purchases. We wait for phone calls, emails, cards, and letters. We wait for news. We take an aspirin for a headache and have to wait for that to work. It seems unfair. In this day of, "Having it my way," and "instant gratification," one would think that someone would create a way to cut out some of the waiting.

When I began working for an airline, I was informed that I would have to work nights, weekends, and even holidays. I really wanted this job, so I accepted the terms willingly. The idea of working a holiday did not seem appealing, but I figured that I would celebrate with my wife and family the day before or after the holiday. I had to tell myself that it would not bother me to be away on a holiday. It was just another day.



The 2002 Christmas season was in full swing. Our home was completely decorated, including the family Christmas tree. The presents were under the tree. It was Christmas Eve, and holiday

plans were in motion. My wife, Susan and I were both at home and we were finishing last minute preparations.

Then the phone rang! I had almost forgotten I was on call. Picking up the receiver, I pressed it to my ear and heard, "This is airline scheduling. I have a four-trip for you Mr. Perkins, and it begins in two hours." My heart sank as I acknowledged the caller. I watched as disappointment spread across Susan's face. In shock and disbelief, I put on my uniform, grabbed my flight bags, and headed for the airport.

Once in the airport crew-room, I heard the story of how the flight attendant I was replacing had become sick on the airplane and had to leave by ambulance. Some said it was food poisoning and others said it was a severe case of the flu. I was a little envious as I watched my coworkers clocking out to leave for the holiday.

That night, I sat in my hotel room thinking about what everyone was doing back home. They would be crowded around the television in the family room, watching Christmas movies. They would begin with "The Christmas Story" and "Nester the Long Eared Donkey." Afterwards, they would all mimic the puppets, as they watched, "Emmett Otter's Jug Band Christmas." I always pretended I did not like Emmett Otter, but it has grown on me throughout the years. I missed being at church as the Christ candle is lit and voices in unison sing "Silent Night." Engulfed in sadness, I turned out the lights.

I awoke and realized instantly it was Christmas morning! It was too quiet! There were no excited children running and yelling. There was no smell of "Monkey Bread," baking in the oven. There was no nudge on the shoulder or kiss on the cheek to waken me saying, "Merry Christmas Dennis." It was just me. I was alone, and it was time to get ready for work. A voice inside me screamed, "Wait a minute! This is not fair. People do not work on Christmas Day! I have never worked on Christmas."

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As I was getting dressed, I envisioned everyone sitting around the tree, opening presents. I wanted to be there. I wanted to see the faces of everyone as they opened their gifts; and I must confess, I wanted to open the ones that I knew were for me. Once again, the silent voice echoed, "How am I going to wait three more days?"

It was a busy day. Most of the North and East Coast was blanketed in snow. There were high winds that tossed the small aircraft without mercy. Flights were delayed, but none were canceled. The airline had a hot dinner for all of us to enjoy in the crew-room, and I pretended to be sitting at home with everyone around the table, as I ate turkey, gravy, stuffing, cranberry sauce, and mashed potatoes. I tried to disguise the fact that I was home sick.

Days seemed like weeks as I worked the additional flight days. Even though I enjoy flying and working as a flight attendant, I could not escape the sick feeling just below the surface. I felt like a hole had formed in my chest, and it was rapidly growing.

Finally, the fourth day of ups and downs was over. It was time to go home. I was ecstatic to see everyone and to be home. In my joy, I also realized that time spent away from family and friends cannot be replaced. I realized then how important it is to have a good relationship with my family, my wife, and with God. These relationships withstand the test of time. I need to be prepared and ready at all times. I need to make the best out of the time I have with them.

In Luke 35-40, the bible talks about waiting and being ready: "Be dressed ready for service and keep your lamps burning, like men waiting for their master to return from a wedding banquet, so that when he comes and knocks they can immediately open the door for him.

It will be good for those servants whose master finds them watching when he comes. I tell you

the truth, he will dress himself to serve, will have them recline at the table and will come and wait on them. It will be good for those servants whose master finds them ready, even

if he comes in the second or third watch of the night. But understand this: If the owner of the house had known at what hour the thief was coming, he would not have let his house be broken into. You also must be ready, because the Son of Man will come at an hour when you do not expect him."

I imagine when Jesus called His disciples, they also longed for home. By example Jesus taught them to serve and teach others to be ready while they waited. Are you ready or just dreading the wait?
