# From the Community Lay Director ...

In the Priorities talk outline, there is this suggested line. What do you think about, where do you spend your time and where do you spend your money? This is what your priority is.

I was recently asked about my commitment to the Emmaus Community. Why do I spend so much of my time and resources on Emmaus? The short answer is this, because it works.

In the eleven or so years that I have been associated with the Fredericksburg Emmaus Community I have seen many changes. Most of those changes are associated with adjusting to more closely line up with the national model. I believe the quality of our pilgrims coming to and leaving our weekends is improving because we are following those guidelines from the Upper Room Emmaus national organization.

I have seen dozens of people "activated" by their experience on their Emmaus weekend. People who were filling pews and being ministered to, suddenly become active in all sorts of church and community activities. Like dropping coins into a pay phone they suddenly come alive and touch the lives of dozens of individuals all around them. The Fredericksburg area is a better place to live as a result.

Just in my home church, Emmaus community members have become involved in many such activities. Bible studies have been started for certain groups of women and children, where there was none before. Our mission team has reached out to the homeless shelter preparing meals one or more times per month. Two mission teams have been to Mississippi and Louisiana to help hurricane victims in the past year. Some are quieter less noticed but they work on the church newsletter, children's ministry and visit the elderly.

I see the ripple effect like the pebble that falls into a quiet pond. Their affect is felt in the church, their community and they reach out across the nation and even the world. Many were "dormant" until they took the Walk to Emmaus and Jesus was revealed to them in a new way.

This is why I believe in the Emmaus movement, because it works. This is why many that have come before me have dedicated their energy and resources to this valuable tool which lifts up and disciple's church leaders. I am certain many will come after to carry on. In the Priorities talk outline, there is this suggested line. What do you think about, where do you spend your time and where do you spend your money?

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

It was summertime in Southern Virginia, and my dad was taking me fishing. I was living the good life! Three of my favorite things as a young boy were summer, fishing, and being with my dad.

My dad said the best time to fish is in the evening, so we had an early supper. The two of us met up with a family friend, Mr. Brock. We hitched up the boat trailer and crowded into the cab of his pickup truck. Now we were off and on our way to the pond. Traveling eastward out of town, the rattle of tailgate chains and fishing equipment were music to my ears. Making a few turns, we soon turned onto a rustic dirt road. In reality, it was a path cut through the woods by tire tracks with a grassy strip down the middle. The pickup dipped and rocked as we slowly blazed the muddy road filled with potholes. Mr. Brock and my dad struggled to roll up their windows as water splashed out of the puddles, and tree limbs whipped and beat the sides of the truck. Due to the difficulty in accessing the abandoned pond, few hearty souls attempted to fish there.

Finally, we arrived at the shore of the pond. The bank was lined with briars, bushes, and weeds, which made it difficult to launch the boat. We found a sandy area, and my dad told me to climb into the boat. Mr. Brock backed the trailer into the water, and I held on as the boat slid into the water and began to float. My dad steadied the bow of the boat against the shore. The two men climbed in and sat on the combination seat and floatation devices. I sat in the middle, peering warily at the green slime and lily pads that covered much of the surface. Dead trees stood tall in the center much like stalagmites in a cave.

The small craft skimmed the water as Mr. Brock operated the whisper-quiet electric motor. My dad and I prepared the fishing rods as we traveled to our choice spot. Dad tapped me on the shoulder, handed me a piece of plastic bait, and confidently remarked, "Dennis, tie on this purple worm. This is what the larger Bass are biting today!"

Mr. Brock reached into his brown paper bag, sharing cookies, Nabs, and sodas while saying, "Here, have a snack. You can't fish hungry!" Arriving in an area where thick bushes hung over the water, we slowed and cast our lines toward shore. I overcast, and my line landed in a bush. Without missing a beat, my dad commented, "There's no fish in the bushes. Throw your bait into the water." I gently freed the purple worm from the bush and allowed it to drop into the water. The water exploded with life, as a huge Large Mouth Bass swallowed my bait. I pulled back on the rod to set the hook. The Bass danced on the surface of the water, as he shook his head, realizing he had been hooked. My dad and Mr. Brock cheered me on, wanting to help, but knowing I needed to land this fish on my own. I kept the line taut as I heard the big fish stripping line from my reel as he swam deep. After a while, the fish struggled less, and I was able to reel him in.

Out of the water, we appropriately admired the scaled denizen of the deep. Twisting the hook, I removed it from his mouth. Grasping him by the lip, I gently lowered him into the water until he could swim off on his own. With a splash, the biggest fish I had ever caught swam away.

Although I was learning sportsmanship, this fishing trip was not about going fishing or even catching a big fish. This was about sharing time with my father--talking, laughing, and enjoying time together. Ask any adult today what positive thing they remember about their dad. I am sure they will tell a story about time shared camping, hunting, fishing, a sporting event, or other time spent together. Rarely will you hear about toys or money.

Lets think about this for a moment and apply our relationship with our earthly father to our heavenly Father. 

The Board of Directors met before the gathering at Tappahannock Memorial Church in Tappahannock VA.on July 8, 2006.

We have continued to hear reports from community volunteers to see how we might help one another and also to identify any adjustments in job descriptions or needs our volunteers may have.

Dick Barnett gave a very thorough report on the 4<sup>th</sup> day ministry activities for the past year. The 4<sup>th</sup> day ministry currently has work groups looking at ways to improve DDUs and Gatherings, Teaming and Training and to implement a Pastor survey. The board voted to have the 4<sup>th</sup> day ministry continue their work in these areas as is. We also voted to accept recommendations concerning changes in the conducting of the DDU.

A committee was formed to look at how we use the community database and newsletter. As the community grows and identity theft becomes more common we need to be aware of privacy issues. This committee will make recommendations as to how we may develop a policy to best serve the community in these areas.


