# From the Community Lay Director

I am back from a mission trip to Iquitos Peru and it was amazing. We had only planned on two objectives. Primarily we were doing construction on a church in one of the poorest areas of the city called Belen. The second was to show God's love to the children of that neighborhood. God had a few other things for us as well.

There were many talks from Emmaus that I saw – rather than heard. There were many examples of Christian Action. We helped fix the building that will be the neighborhood church and we played with the kids. We showed the love that God has shown us. We colored, played soccer, played volleyball, held kids and loved on them.

One thing that was noticed by Tim Patrick who was there two years ago was that the fathers then had nothing to do with their children. That has changed. The local church we were working with keeps bringing in missionary teams and the example of playing and loving on the children is changing parental behavior in Belen. That's Changing Our World.

I saw the Body of Christ coming together as a Christian community to accomplish the tasks at hand. Some used their gifts to work with the kids while others worked on the building. We joined with the local church members to help work on the building – its amazing what a machete can do in the hands of someone who knows how to use it.

A highlight of the trip for me was Antonio. He had come to the hotel where we were staying to sell us trinkets. What he ended up with was a relationship with Jesus. Saturday morning we prayed to bring a man to Christ while we were in Peru. Sunday morning, Antonio was putting his faith in Jesus. You might call that conversion Sanctifying Grace. He has a long way to go in understanding his faith – but don't we all.

Antonio kept coming back each night to learn more about the Bible and his newly found faith. He was led thru parts of the Gospel of John. I'll call that Grow Through Study. He now has a Spanish version of the Bible that he can read from.

You don't have to go to Peru or another foreign country to experience these talks. You can experience them right where you are. Your mission area could be just down the road. It could be your neighbor. It might be someone in your own family.

Being on this mission trip brought back memories from my walk. Do you want to re-experience your walk? Try pulling out your notes. Pull out your agape bag. Come to Candlelight or a Gathering. You can also give a similar experience you had on your Walk to someone else - sponsor a pilgrim. Even put in a teaming application – teaming for the Spring walks will be here sooner than you think.

# From the Community Spiritual Director

Herein is love, not that we loved God but that He loved us and sent His Son to be the propitiation for our sins. Beloved, if God so loved us, we ought also to love one another. (1 John 4:10 – 11)

So...I have been meditating lately on our great God. John MacArthur states that a proper Christianity begins with a proper view of God, a very "high" view of who God is, who we are in light of who God is, and what God has done for us. To that end, this past week in my personal meditations I have been thinking about "the amazing grace of an amazing God." (Catchy title huh?)

Have you ever sat and thought just about the "amazingness" of grace? More specifically, have you ever thought of God's "amazing" ability to love wretched people such as you and me. The truth of Scripture is this: there is no redeeming quality in you and I that God should even want to love us, He is under no obligation to love us, and He would be perfectly justified in not loving us, yet He chooses to love us. There is a passage of Scripture that totally astounded me the first time that I read and comprehended the meaning of it, and it still continues to amaze me to this day. In Genesis 8:21, God declares a covenant that He will never again curse the ground because of man "even though every inclination of his heart is evil from childhood." To be sure, this is shortly after the flood when the face of the earth was cleansed from the results of man's sin and here already the testimony of God is that the inclination of the heart of man is evil from childhood. We are sinful people and desperately wicked. When Isaiah comprehended the glory and righteousness of a Holy God he cried out in anguish: "Woe is me! For I am lost; for I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips; for my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts! (Isaiah 6:5)" We are a sinful people in the presence of a Holy God and we should be altogether undone, left completely devoid of any merit whatsoever on our part.

Is it any wonder that John declares that this great love of God toward us is the very definition of love itself? It is God's love toward us – totally underserving of it – that defines the very essence of love and defines how we are to love one another. Specifically, we are to love each other, not regardless of merit, but in spite of the lack of merit. Jesus makes a simple, yet profound point in His "sermon on the mount." Namely, Jesus points out that anyone can love those who treat them well. Even the pagans and the tax collectors (the lowest people on earth in the eyes of the Jew-totally devoid of redeeming qualities), even these people love their enemies. Accordingly, what have you done that is so special if you love the people that are nice to you, or love the people that treat you with love? Rather, what Christ calls us to, as a result of God's love for us, is to love our enemies, to love and pray for those who treat us horribly, who spit in your face, who curse you, who mock you, who treat you poorly, love them anyway and pray for them with all your might. This is the love that we are called to. This is the love that turns a world upside down. This is the type of love that challenges people in their dismissal of God. This is the love that leads people to the foot of the cross and into repentance.

So, how do we learn to love like that? Let me take you to the book of Ruth. The beginning of this book tells us about the loving devotion that Ruth had for Naomi, her mother-inlaw. In Ruth 1:16, Ruth makes an oath to Naomi that wherever she went Ruth would follow and that she would die in the same place that Naomi died. Then, Ruth prayed that God would judge her severely if she allowed anything but death to separate her from Naomi.

What is so amazing about this is-despite the speculation you may have heard in a sermon somewhere-there is absolutely no reason given to us in the text to justify this type of loving devotion on the part of Ruth. Moreover, in a passionate speech to her two daughters-in-law Naomi makes it clear that by going with her there are no good options for the future in front of them. Orpah and Ruth are at a crossroads in their lives, they must choose to return home or to continue on with Naomi. It is only Ruth who chooses to remain and is subsequently rewarded for that faithfulness. Ruth's love and devotion toward Naomi is without rhyme or reason and demonstrates the truth of the Old Testament hesed of God.

Hesed is a Hebrew word that has the essence of a deep, abiding, loyal, covenant keeping love. In its fullest context it has the idea of keeping a covenant promise, not out of a sense of obligation, but as a product of one's love toward another. I will do what I have promised, not because I am compelled to, but because I want to out of my love toward you. This is the love that God has toward us and that He then commands that we have toward one another. It is a kind of love that goes totally against every grain of rational thought of the world. It is the kind of love that causes a man to love the murder of his father and to identify this former murderer as grandpa to his children.

Last month I challenged each of you to turn your world upside down for Christ. The way that begins is by allowing the love of God to flow through to the point you have a genuine love for your enemies. It happens when you allow the hesed of God to flow through you to touch the lives of those who are devoid of real love. Will you allow God to plant His love deep in your heart?
